CALL TO ORDER

1. Call to order. (13-1401)

The meeting was called to order by Chair Pat Wallach at 8:04 a.m.

I. PRESENTATIONS

4. SAN GABRIEL VALLEY PARK AND RIDES (13-1404)

Roland Cordero, Director of Facilities, presented this item and reported the following:

• Traffic conditions in Southern California are one of the worst in the Nation. According to the Annual Congestion Report issued in February 2012, by the Texas Transportation Institute, the Los Angeles area comes in second to Washington D.C. in traffic congestion.

- Park and Ride lots can make commuting easier and give commuters a place to park their car and travel via van pool, car pool and public transit.
- From the early 1990's to early 2000, Foothill Transit's efforts in developing park and ride projects were unsuccessful. To improve the progress of park and ride projects, the Transit Oriented Neighborhood Program (TONP) was developed in 2003. The TONP concept included partnering with member cities and providing member cities with funding for park and ride facilities as part of planned mixed-use developments.
- In 2003, Foothill Transit Executive Board adopted the TONP to accomplish the following:
 - Develop an effective method of funding for Park and Ride Structures
 - Clarify Foothill Transit's role in providing commuter parking to customers
 - Improve relationships with cities, and being responsive to customers' needs
 - Encourage member cities to incorporate commuter parking in their mixed-use developments
 - Minimize service impacts resulting from agency investments in parking structures

Park and Ride Criteria

- To optimize public use of Park and Ride facilities, projects are being planned as follows:
 - Near future growth area to serve the greatest population densities
 - Close to origin of users, preferably located within five miles of users
 - Adjacent to freeway interchanges to reduce travel times for users

Park and Ride Amenities

 Commuters prefer a clean and attractive site. Poor site maintenance and lighting generates safety concerns. Other amenities preferred by users include:

- Posted bus schedule
- Shelters
- Bike parking
- Having restrooms in the park and ride facilities is an additional cost and generally attracts drifters. Graffiti and marking are common issues along with maintenance costs for restrooms in the facilities.

Statement of Proceedings

Community Economic Considerations

 Public Transit agencies have advocated Transit Oriented developments, but some cities find it difficult to embrace the concept, as park and ride structures take away the opportunity for development of revenue generation for cities through property tax and retail sales tax.

The Board suggested that staff:

- 1. continue working with the City of West Covina with the prospect of having a Park and Ride Facility in the city,
- 2. continue to explore and identify other potential Park and Ride locations; and
- 3. inform the Board when a location is identified.
